## Professional Experience

2016 – present – **University of Nevada, Las Vegas (UNLV)**, Las Vegas NV., Dean, School of Allied Health Sciences, Division of Health Sciences. UNLV offers more than 220 degree programs and has more than 28,000 students and 3,000 faculty and staff. The University is a Minority Serving Institution and is also a Hispanic Serving Institution with an enrollment of 25 percent of students meeting the U.S. Department of Education's definition of Hispanic Serving Institution. UNLV also is recognized as an Asian-American, Native-American, Pacific-Islander-Serving Institution. It is the second most diverse university in the nation. The Division of Health Sciences comprises the Schools of Medicine, Dental Medicine, Nursing, Community Health, Allied Health. The Division is developing academic research, and community service programs to meet the health care needs of the growing region. The School of Allied Health Sciences prepares its students to excel in their respective industries by combining theoretical learning with internships and practical laboratory experiences. The majority of students have passed their accreditation exams, secured employment prior to graduation, pursued other graduate degrees and advanced to leadership roles. Academic programs include health physics and diagnostic sciences, nuclear medicine, comprehensive medical imaging, radiochemistry, radiography, kinesiology, nutrition, athletic training and physical therapy. All programs are accredited by national organizations. Departments in which these programs are housed include the Department of Health Physics and Diagnostic Sciences, the Department of Kinesiology and Nutrition Sciences, and the Department of Physical Therapy. Students within the School of Allied

Health Sciences have access to a number of laboratories in which to complete department-specific laboratory procedures of research studies. These facilities include the spectroscopy laboratory, the liquid scintillation laboratory, the environmental radiochemistry laboratory, the radiochemistry and environmental health physics laboratory, the hot sample preparation laboratory, the survey instrument laboratory, the tissue culture laboratory, the radiography imaging laboratory, the biomechanics laboratory, the exercise physiology laboratory, the motor performance and learning laboratory, the physical activity policy research laboratory, the athletic training teaching laboratory, the gait and balance laboratory, the diagnostic laboratory and the pediatrics laboratory. The School has a 5 million dollar grant portfolio and an Office of Research to support pre- and post-award activities in the School. Grant awards are from the National Institutes of Health, the State of Nevada, Foundations and other resources. The School also includes its own Advising Center that provides guidance for all undergraduate students in the School of Nursing, the School of Community Health Sciences, and the School of Allied Health Sciences.

Service to the University of Nevada, Las Vegas has included appointments to the dean's search committee for the School of Nursing, the Library and the Ombudsman search for the University. I also serve on the strategic planning committee for the Top Tier University status for the Health Sciences Center as well as the Top Tier Committee for Research at the University.

2013 - 2016 – **University of North Texas at Dallas (UNT-Dallas)**, Dallas, TX. President/ Associate Vice Chancellor of Academic (Health) Affairs. The University of Texas at Dallas is a component institution of the University of North Texas System. The University of North Texas at Dallas became the first and only public institution of higher learning in the city of Dallas. Enrolling freshmen through master's degree students in undergraduate and graduate programs, the University has seen its headcount increase significantly over the past several years. The University was recently approved as a doctoral granting institution by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools with the approval of the addition of the College of Law to the University. UNT Dallas, designated as a Hispanic Serving Institution boasts one of the most diverse student bodies in the nation and is poised to embark upon a fundamental redefinition of the urban

university through the far-sighted recommendations of its Commission on Building the University of the 21st Century. The University consists of four schools/colleges including the: (1) School of Liberal Arts and Sciences, (2) School of Business, (3) School of Education and Human Services and the (4) College of Law which is located downtown. The University was estimated in 2013 to have created \$35.3 million in added regional income with a value of \$835 million in added state income over the course of students' lives. The following report directly to the President: the Provost and Vice President for Academic Excellence and Student Success, Vice President for Finance and Administration, Vice President for Research, Graduate Programs and Economic Development, Vice President for University Advancement, Associate Provost for Institutional Effectiveness, and Executive Director of the Caruth Police Institute.

This was due to the implementation of an academic skills course during the freshman year, introduced supplemental instruction in high stake courses, a heavily used early alert system and a much more rigorous advisement center and student success center that included enhanced tutoring, a writing and mathematics center and increased student activities.
- Developed an Office of on-line learning that introduced hybrid and online courses and programs within the University.
- Increased online and hybrid courses by nearly 100%. By 2015 over 200 courses were available online and entire majors also were available online.
- We developed a Saturday Masters of Business Administration (MBA) program and as a result enrollment doubled from the original program.
- We developed an accelerated Masters in Counseling program.
- Introduced the FOCUS program which is a guaranteed tuition program that freezes tuition for all full-time incoming freshmen.
- Reconstructed the entire admissions, financial aid, and registrar's office so that services were more accessible to students and also established a student concierge program.

Founded in 1868, Wayne State University is a large, diverse, urban research university dedicated to providing access to a world class higher education for well-prepared students from all walks of life, to service in its community and to the creation of new knowledge. The University lies in the heart of midtown Detroit, the cultural hub of the city. The Health Sciences Center for which I also had responsibility is at the heart of medical education, research and clinical care in midtown Detroit along with the schools of pharmacy and nursing.

The University has international programs that it sponsors throughout the world including China, Israel and India where I traveled regularly to develop new academic programs. As the anchor research urban university in Detroit and the city's only public research university, Wayne State provides an energized destination for teaching, research, community outreach and creative and performing arts in one of the country's largest cities. In this role, I frequently acted on the President's behalf in overseeing the university during his absence, including representing the University externally. In addition to serving as chief academic officer where I oversaw academic programs in 13 schools and colleges including the School of Medicine where the dean of the School reported to me, I also supervised all activities related to student affairs as well as libraries, information technology, and the Wayne University Press as well as overseeing the administration and budgetary management of the university's 13 schools and colleges and a central administrative staff report directly to the Provost. I presided over the Council of Deans, chaired the Academic Senate, and presided at meetings of the executive committee of the Senate. I managed a budget of approximately 600 million dollars. I also worked directly with the Board of Governors related to academic issues of the university. Wayne State University is a comprehensive university that is classified by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching as Very High research activity, the Foundation's highest research category. The total research expenditure of the University exceeds 250 million dollars and grew significantly during my tenure at the University. Wayne State is one of only two urban universities nationally with both the highest Carnegie Foundation classifications for Research and for Community Engagement, Outreach, and Partnerships. There are over 32,000 students from 49 states and 70 countries. I also represented the University as a partner in the University Research Corridor with the University of Michigan and Michigan State University and served as a member of the Wayne State University Foundation Board as well as the Board of Directors for the Fund for Medical Research and Education.

- Wayne State University had \$254.4 million in 2011 in research expenditures according to the National Science Foundation. During the past year, the university's total funding reached more than \$187.2 million and research funds topped \$159.4 million, the highest level in the university's history. The university's research funding has increased by nearly 30%. This in large part is due to close collaboration with the Vice-President of Research and strategic hires made by the various colleges and schools.
- Secured continued investments in library acquisitions and classroom technology to improve scholarship across the campuses
- Have revamped the promotion and tenure system at the University so that only the most qualified individuals are promoted and tenured.
